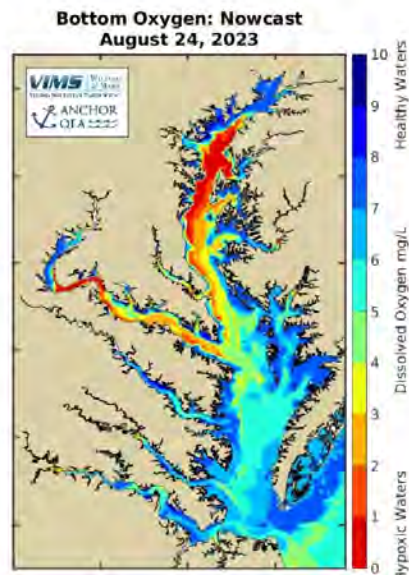

Redfish "Spots" Tournament Rules

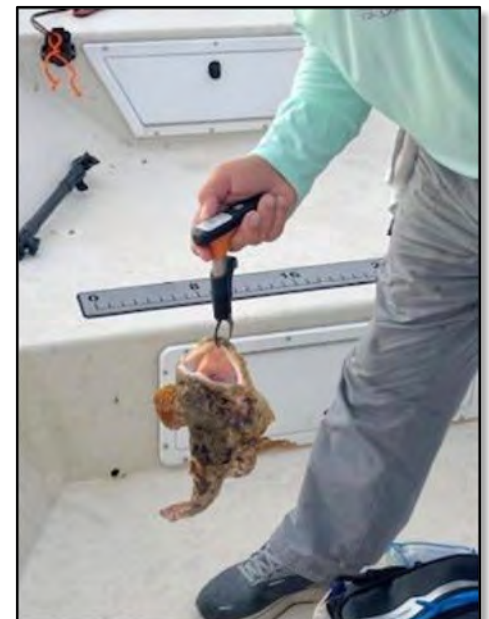


- Must be a Norfolk Anglers Club Member
- Tournament for fish caught between January 1, 2026 and December 31, 2026
- Must have the Norfolk Anglers Club decal in the photo with the fish on a measuring device* showing the total length of the fish. See NAC Prize Fish Contest Rules for measuring info. *Entries received with decal and no measurement can only be judged by number of spots. Photo entries without a decal or measurement tape are not accepted.
- Red Drum/Redfish up to 26 inches in length only and caught in Virginia and North Carolina waters
- Awards determined by 1st: number of Spots (on one side), 2nd: Largest Fish up to 26 inches, 3rd: Date of Catch
- Entries submitted on the Club Prize Fish Entry Form with photo (can be sent electronically to; NorfolkAnglersClub@gmail.com)
- No entry fee except the cost of the decal (\$1)
- \$50.00 Gift Card to the 1st Place Angler, \$25.00 Gift Card for the 2nd Place Angler.

The Virginia Game Fish Tagging Program (VGFTP) has been a cooperative project of the Virginia Institute of Marine Science (VIMS) and the Virginia Marine Resources Commission (VMRC) since 1995. We train experienced recreational anglers who volunteer their time to tag and release fishes and share data with fishery managers. 4 DEC: Got into some nice pups last night in Broad Bay right outside Mill Dam Creek. Cut mullet right after sunset. Some big bruisers still swimming around even with the water at 47°. - Andy Reid



13 DEC: Took an 8 hour walk-on charter with Havoc Charters out of Deltaville, VA. Trolled lures at different depths while looking for bait schools. At one point we had 4 rods hooked up, including the double catch pictured. Largest for the day was a 45" release.

20 DEC: Those who know Jere Humphrey know of his angling expertise catching tautogs, sheepshead, and triggerfish (all species really) on the CBBT and inshore wrecks swinging a wreck anchor. Simply stated, Jere is one of the best anglers I know targeting these fish. Now, with his recently installed Rhodan 24V trolling motor on his Mako he's really upped his game! Well Done Jere!

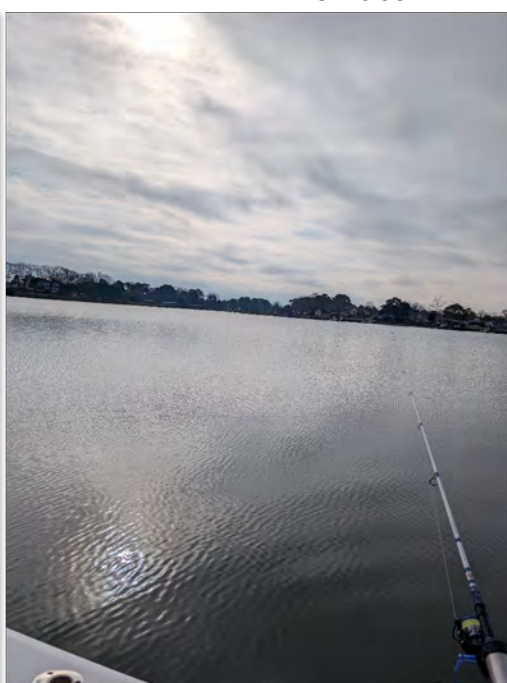
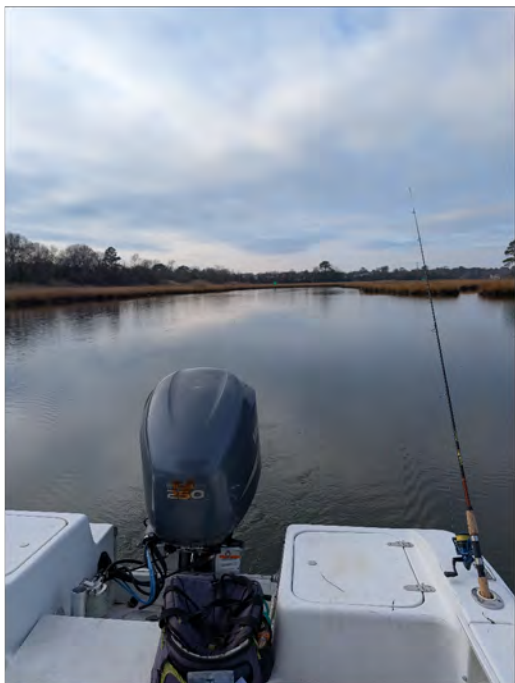
28 DEC: Dave Steele and I took the Sea Pro into Pretty Lake to troll with the Rhodan for some speckled trout and striper.

A side task was to evaluate and learn the 36v Rhodan trolling motor and battery usage and characteristics with the newly installed gateway. Other than a getting on the water and have a good time fishing, the Rhodan was the only successful part of the day. On our previous trip the Rhodan tripped the breaker, I thought it was because it took 94% power to buck the 25 knot wind screaming down Pretty Lake.

We got to the boat at 9AM. It was cold and overcast. I didn't check the current predictions and we had slack or slow moving water until about 1130 (about the time we quit for the day) due to boredom and getting too cold to use our hands.

The Rhodan preformed well all day and the gateway had good information on the MFD which was unavailable before its installation. We trolled for about 3 hours at about 37% power but I don't know the speed (My NAVONICS subscription hasn't been updated on the AXIOM) we only used 15% of the battery charge. I was very happy with the battery and gateway.

20 DEC: With lots of Bluefin Tuna being reported just off the oceanfront we departed the Lafayette River on a chilly Saturday morning with Luke Turk & Harrison Chaires aboard. The recreational season is closed but catching and releasing one of these magnificent fish is too good to pass up. We headed to an area around the Chesapeake Light Tower about 10 nm offshore. Our trolling spread included lines rigged to #12 planers off the stern with pink and green MoJo lures with Nomad DTX lures and ballyhoo rigged off the outriggers.



We didn't see much bird action but marked quite a few schools of fish. The first strike was on the green MoJo lure and resulted in an approximate 72" 200# bluefin tuna alongside the boat before it was safely released. The second strike was a hit and a miss, most likely by a migrating rockfish.

We'll be back out after the New Year when the recreational season opens back up!

20 DEC: I fished Saint Julian Creek on the Elizabeth River for a couple of hours at the end of the outgoing tide. Casting a chartreuse Paul Brown Fat Boy lure, I caught a 22 inch Speckled Trout, a 19 inch Red Drum, and pulled off another three mystery fish. As usual, I fished the creek for almost four hours and had all the action in a 25 minute window. Both fish were tagged and released for the Virginia Game Fish Tagging Program (VGFTP).

18 DEC: Keith Kaufman, his son, Cody and Cody's girlfriend Jayde are experienced Striper fisherman and old friends from my life in PA. With perfect weather forecasted they invited me to troll live eels on the bay for Striped Bass. We met at Morley's Wharf Ramp on the Onancock Creek on the Eastern Shore. A short run, WSW, out of the creek we hit 40 ft. Cody put out a spread of 6 rods with planner boards and 1 center shot on a large trip float. The eels we used were huge by my standards, 18+". We were trolling between 1 and 1.5 MPHs across the current using a "Sea Anchor" on each side of the boat to slow us down. Wasn't long and we hooked up. They insisted I get the first fish, a 45"er photographed & released. From that point on we had a steady bite resulting in 9 knock down, 6 Stripers boated & released 45" to 48", and 3 that got off (one at the boat ready to be netted). Since we were taking turns Keith & I each got to catch 2 fish. We fished water 40' to 60' and the temperature was 40* to 42*. We might have caught more fish if Keith & I weren't reminiscing old times all day.

28 DEC: Today looked like the only fishable day before 2026 so Mary, John Curry, George Langdon & I took the Shamrock to the "Surry Discharge" to wet our lines. The discharge is a good place to fish since the water is usually pretty warm all winter. Apparently the reactor was down or some other SNAFU and the water was the same as the rest of the James, 42*. We fished for about 3 hours with a dozen other boats. Mary caught 4 Catfish and a Speck, George caught a Catfish, and John & I got skunked. We saw a couple other boats catch a very few Specks. - Henry Troutner



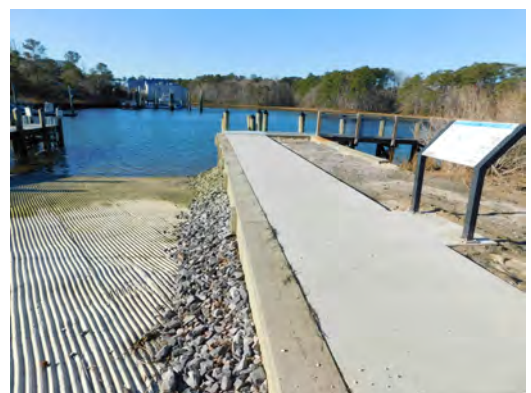
Angler Interests

Owls Creek (Rudee Inlet) Public Boat Ramp Update

Construction has finished at the Owls Creek boat ramp and there are few concerns and observations to share with our readership. The primary concern is the shortened length of the boat ramps. While the grooved surface is a welcome feature the shortened length of the ramps are of great concern. Previous ramps according to a City Engineer were 90' in length and the current length is 71' which doesn't extend past the piers. The contractor did place "End of Ramp" signs to caution boaters. Boaters should exercise caution when launching their boats especially at low tide. The contractor placed "rip rap" stone beyond the ramp to lessen the drop off and prevent prop washout.

They also placed rock along the sides of the ramps where the cofferdams were removed but this presents another challenge in positioning a trailer close to the pier. Some of these issues the city can mitigate quickly, the bigger issue of ramp length is a more challenging and longer term fix.

So, if you're down at the ramp and another angler is using the ramp, become a safety observer and don't let someone drop their trailer wheels off the ramp. We can look out for each other until some of this gets fixed.
