
Earlier this year, we told you about the RecFish app being developed by Dr. Lisa Kellogg and colleagues at the Virginia Institute of Marine Science. Its goal is to encourage recreational anglers to collect and contribute catch data to help improve fisheries science. Once it's fully developed, the user-friendly, free app will also tell anglers the species and length of their catch and whether it is legal to keep and safe to eat.

Dr. Kellogg says that, with the help of photos you submitted, the computer model can now identify 60 fish species with 95% accuracy and another 20 species are in the works. That represents thousands of submitted pictures!

You can help by going to www.recfish.org and uploading your fish photos. RecFish especially needs photos of:

- Kingfish (a.k.a. Roundheads, Kingcroaker, Whiting, Sea Mullet)
- Flounder and other flatfish

Phase 2 of app development is almost complete, and, when it is, you will be able to use the app to upload your fish photos directly from your phone. Until then, keep those pictures coming at www.recfish.org!

Sea Tow Hampton Roads, Captain Ed Schrader



Sea Tow is a community exclusively for the boating community. Ed & Karen Schrader, owners of Sea Tow Hampton Roads, are one of the more than 100 Sea Tow franchises in the United States and Europe. Like all Sea Tow locations, they provide 24/7 coverage for non-emergency on the water assistance. Sea Tow membership includes assistance towing, battery jump starts while you're out on the water, fuel/oil delivery, covered ungroundings, and much more. Captain Ed Schrader was asked "How far out do you go?" and his reply was "As far as you do". Sea Tow doesn't have any specific offshore distance limits and is only limited by the sea conditions, fuel range of their boats, and ability to communicate with you on the water. Captain Schrader shared that if Sea Tow can't safely get to you for any reason they will assist in arranging an alternate provider and reimbursement up to \$5,000 per incident.



Captain Schrader shared that your Sea Tow membership covers your no matter where you are. The membership covers the boats you own that are on your membership no matter who operates them. Your memberships also covers you if you borrow a friend's boat, charter or lease a boat. He added, If the owner of the boat is onboard your membership privileges do not apply and the responsibility falls on the owner.

The two most common memberships are the Sea Tow Gold Card and the Lake Card, \$179 and \$119 respectively, for an annual

membership. The principle difference between these two membership levels is that the Lake Card covers all inland waters (excluding Florida) whereas the Gold card covers you everywhere. If you boat exclusively in Smith Mountain Lake, Lake Gaston or *other inland waters only*, the Lake Card might be a consideration. For the Hampton Roads area, the Gold Card membership is your choice. When you consider the cost of commercial assistance towing the \$179 annual membership is a very small price to pay for the assurance that your towing troubles will not follow you back to the dock.

Captain Schrader was asked about the cost of towing for non-members. He shared, in the Hampton Roads area the average tow time is about 2.5 hours. At \$300/hour during daylight hours, that equates to a \$750 towing bill. Towing time begins when the Sea Tow boat departs the slip and ends once it returns to the slip and reset for the

next run. For reference, a tow from the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel 4th Island back to Lynnhaven (Lynnhaven Boatel) averages 2.5 to 3.0 hours, depending on conditions. Many don't realize that once a vessel is under tow the average towing speed is 6 knots however, that depends on factors such as how the vessel rides through the water, sea conditions, other boat traffic, and the return route taken.

So what should you do when you first encounter a problem on the water? Captain Schrader recommends to take a minute to first assess your issue and stabilize the situation. For an onboard emergency, such as an injury, fire, flooding your first call is the *U.S. Coast Guard Sector Virginia* on VHF Channel 16. The USCG is trained and

equipped to respond to emergency situations and your call on VHF Channel 16 may also summon other resources like the Marine Police or other vessels in the immediate area for assistance. Responding vessels will need your location and the best possible position you can provide is GPS or Global Positioning System coordinates. If your vessel is drifting near an obstruction (Bridge, Rocks, Jetty, etc), shipping channel, or is in danger of grounding, deploy your anchor with enough line (scope) to hold the bottom. Providing an accurate positon and anchoring will prevent responding vessels from having to spend valuable time searching for you. Don't forget your Personal Flotation Device (PFD). In an emergency situation put it on before you need it.



Captain Schrader advises for non-emergency situations contact Sea Tow Hampton Roads (VHF Channel 16) and they'll help in evaluating your situation and coordinate to get assistance headed your way as quickly as possible. He shared some common non-emergency issues are the engine cutoff switch (Kill Switch) and the in-gear start protection on boats. Occasionally the engine cutoff switch can become dislodged and without it properly installed the engine will turn over but will not start. Many outboards will emit a constant warning tone while the motor is being cranked, others and some inboards may not. It's not unusual if your motor suddenly stops to forget to place



it in neutral before attempting a restart. In this instance nothing will happen when you turn the key. Fortunately, Ed & Karen Schrader are available 24/7 to respond to calls for assistance. They've heard and seen just about everything in the 15 years running the Hampton Roads business. When your boating issue can't be resolved quickly, they'll have a Captain headed your way. With 8 Sea Tow boats, 4 in the water ready to go and 4 more on trailers ready to travel to more remote areas, their team is ready to respond.

Depending on how far offshore you're located you may initially be talking with *USCG Sector Virginia*. Sea Tow Hampton Roads maintains

a VHF antenna and system that can reach out to about 30-40 nautical miles. VHF radio signals operate on a line-of-sight basis and the higher the antenna generally means the longer the range. Typical HandHeld VHF radios may only operate 5-8 nm and vessel mounted radios with fixed antennas may only reach 15-20nm. Weather and atmospheric conditions also affect radio ranges. The USCG maintains multiple radio towers along the coast and have the furthest reach. The VHF radio is one of the most important safety devices you have on your boat and while most recreational vessels are not required to have a VHF radio, having one may some day save your life. Cellular Phones versus VHF radio? It's as simple as this; VHF radios reach lots of people and can summon

assistance quickly versus a Cellular phone reaching a single person at a time. Then there's a cellular coverage issue...



USCG AUX Float Plans are another safety consideration, especially for boaters headed offshore or in areas not frequented by vessel traffic. Your Float Plan will include a vessel description, contact information, planned travel locations, the radio frequencies you monitor, crew listing, and expected time of return.

While minor ungroundings are a covered service under your Sea Tow membership salvage work and major ungroundings are additional services Sea Tow can provide. What's the difference between a minor and major ungrounding? It's factor of time & materials, if a vessel aground can be freed with a minimal amount of effort (15 minutes of pulling to free the vessel), it's a covered minor ungrounding. Captain Schrader shared that often time & tide



is all that's required to free your vessel. If you suspect the hull or motor has been damaged or there's a risk of sinking with the rising tide, it's best to contact Sea Tow for assistance. They have all the equipment necessary to safely unground and tow your vessel to a haul-out facility.

Salvage is another additional service Sea Tow provides. They have specialized equipment and training to safely free, refloat, and tow your vessel to a haul-out facility.

Major ungroundings and Salvage are services that will likely be insurance claims. Captain Schrader stressed the importance of having insurance for your vessel to cover





catastrophic loss, injuries, and liability. He added your Sea Tow membership *is not* insurance, it's assurance. The assurance that Sea Tow is available around the clock to provide on the water assistance without having to contact anyone else or submit any paperwork or claims. Sea Tow does offer a specialized insurance program only available to Sea Tow members, it's called Sea Insure®.






Fishing Reports...



Labor Day: After hearing rave reviews about the salmon and lake trout fishery in Lake Ontario, Dave Steele, Dennis Blohm and I headed out to Sodus Bay, New York on Labor Day weekend. Sodus Bay is about 50 miles east of Rochester, north of the Fingers Lake or about 10 hours north of Tidewater. We had planned on 2.5 days of fishing with Predator Charters. Arrived on a Saturday and fished the half day on Sunday.

Headed out Sunday afternoon and trolled up a King Salmon. The Sunday morning half-day had done really well and we expected a great start until the weather closed in. Five-to-six-foot waves and building winds put a quick end to that day.



The first full day charter started at 6:00 am on Monday and we soon had another King Salmon in the box. However, the skies to the west darkened and the wind kicked up along with the seas. Between Rochester and Sodus Bay, moving east was another line of thunder storms, 50 mph winds, water spouts and appropriate high seas. Back to the barn again.

Tuesday, we headed out very early to try and make up for the lost fishing time from the prior day and a half. Blue bird conditions, light winds and a much calmer lake prevailed. Caught a Coho Salmon early and wondered if one fish caught meant time to head in. Fished to late in the afternoon catching lake trout and salmon.

During the trip we caught 6 Lake Trout to 13 lbs, 2 King Salmon to 16 lbs and 5 Coho salmon to 9 lbs. Highly recommend this trip. Captain Wilkinson was great to fish with and set up our lodging for the four nights we were in town. - Bob Stuhlman


water and other hard baits with no success.

11-13 SEP: Louis Glaser and I have been getting out fishing the Little Creek jetties at daybreak most every day lately and the results have been sporadic. Fishing with topwater lures, I did manage to catch and release two prize fish club minimums:

On the 11th, a 21-inch speckled trout and on the 13th a 22-inch speckled trout. Most of the trips we caught 2-3 trout, an occasional puppy drum and several bluefish each trip with the trout mostly in the 17–19-inch range with Louis usually catching 2 for my every 1.



But of course, sometimes we ended up with no keeper size trout.

The wind effects the topwater action a lot interfering with the "walking the dog" action needed to attract the bite. MirrOlure Topdog surface lures worked the best lately.

The big fish are coming in but on in small numbers since the water temperature is still 78-80 degrees. Louis has also been catching nice size puppy drum at dusk in the same areas.

past. - Mary and Henry Troutner








4 SEP: On a Saturday, we fished the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel (CBBT) during an outgoing tide. We were fishing alongside of the bridge pilings catching small to medium Spadefish using clam. The spadefish were grouped around the pilings just deep enough to be able to see them in the water.

While dropping a bucktail for Flounder, a 16-inch Gray Trout decided to join us. Once the current was at max flow, we decided to head east while in the Thimble Shoal Channel looking for Cobia. The bay was oddly quiet with very few crabs and Cownose Rays to be seen. We finished the trip not seeing any Cobia.




Gray Triggerfish, tagged and ready for release.



21 SEP: Ned and I had heard from Louis that he; Jerry Gaines and Bert Sainz had gotten limits of trout at daybreak so we decided to give it a try ourselves on the incoming tide. We got out there about 1:00 pm and the current was hardly moving and it was really low tide. I picked up one 18 inch speckled trout at the end of the jetty and Ned got a couple of throwback sized ones and a couple of lizardfish. The wind was blowing 12-15 mph from the east making casting difficult, so we tried to fish a couple of other places to no avail. So, we headed into the Pretty Lake. No joy there either, just some ribbon fish as we trolled the length of the lake and through the channel in Little Creek all the way to the #5 red marker. So, by then the tide had come up and we could see good moving current. As soon as we set up at the jetty again, I hooked up with a nice 19-inch speckled trout, then a 21 inch that I released, then one after another from 16 inch to 19 inches.

They loved my silver MirrOlure MR 52 so I lent Ned a silver MR 27. He started hooking them up. Then he hooked something that pulled line like crazy making us think it was a cownose ray. After a 10-minute fight it turned out to be a 26.5 red drum almost slot keeper. So, Ned released it no worse for wear. Overall, we caught 16 speckled trout 16-21 inches and that one red of Ned's. Kept our double limit and released 6 speckled trout. We were worn out by 6:00 pm and left them biting. Bait was everywhere around us and the fish were not near the rocks. Best day catching

this year.

In between bites we had schools of Bluefish and Spanish Mackerel swimming by which provided us with light tackle fun using metal jigs. You'd see the Spanish chasing baitfish on the surface and casting and retrieving through the disturbance was a guaranteed bite. Quicker than normal retrieves helped minimize cut off lures. The Spanish were on the larger side, measuring 20-24 inches. - Alex Perez

Free Saltwater Fishing Days in Virginia, October 1-3, 2021



The Virginia Marine Resource Commissioner has declared October 1-3, 2021 as Free Fishing Days. During these dates, no Saltwater Recreational Fishing License is required to fish those waters where a Saltwater Recreational Fishing License is lawfully required. This exemption shall not apply to headboats, charterboats, or rental boats.

Recreational Cobia Fishing Permit Reporting Due Oct 6th



RECREATIONAL COBIA PERMIT holders, you are responsible for reporting your trips (i.e., trips with harvest AND trips without harvest) or your lack of participation (i.e., no trips). The reporting requirement for the Recreational Cobia Permit can be found in regulation Chapter 4 VAC 20-510-10 et seq., "Pertaining to Amberjack and Cobia". The full regulation is available on the VMRC website.

All trips, including harvest, catch-and-release, cobia targeted but not caught OR a report of "Did Not Fish" must be provided to the Commission by the 21st day (Oct 6th) after the close of

the recreational cobia season. This means that reports must be submitted through the Saltwater Journal or postmarked by October 6, 2021. Note: if you continue getting reminders to report but have mailed in a paper form, please contact us to confirm your reporting status. We are not responsible for reports lost in the mail.

Operation Paddle Smart: "If Found" Stickers available



When the Coast guard or local emergency responders receive a report or discover a paddle craft adrift, there is no way to determine if the vessel was washed off of a beach during high tide or was separated from its owner during the course of a boating accident. In these situations, the Coast Guard has to assume the owner is in trouble and needs assistance until it can find evidence to support otherwise. As a result the Coast Guard and local harbormasters spend hundreds of thousands of tax dollars per year searching for potential people in distress when there was no one in danger to begin with.


To combat this growing problem, the Coast Guard and Coast Guard Auxiliary have launched Operation Paddle Smart. The cornerstone of Paddle Smart is providing owners of kayaks, canoes, standup paddleboards, and other unregistered watercraft a free "If Found" sticker for their boat to hep reduce the number of unnecessary search and rescue cases.

The stickers are weatherproof, reflective, and provide room for the vessel owner's name and two phone numbers using a waterproof marker. The "If Found" sticker should be placed in a highly visible location inside the vessel's cockpit or near the operators station.
