# **2012 TRIP TO** ALASKA

### TRIP TO ALASKA - 2012

LOCATION: Seward Alaska **REPORTING ANGLER: John Brown** 

In late July/early August, Nancy and I travelled to Alaska. We spent our first week in Denali National Park with the naturalists and wild animals, and week two in Seward and the northern Gulf of Alaska fishing!

We were joined in Seward by my brother Randy and club member Bill Bennett. Along with fishing friends from Corpus Christi, Texas, we chartered the 6-pack boat Crackerjack with Captain Nik Ranta. Captain Ranta is a native Alaskan and year round resident of Seward. He and his business partner, Captain Andy Mezirow are veteran charter boat captains and are the very best in Seward, often featured in Sport Fishing magazine articles.

As you can see in the photos, Crackerjack did not disappoint. Despite some crummy sea state on days 1 and 2 (which limited where we could fish), we managed impressive limits of Halibut and Silver Salmon both days. Then, with all the meat fish we wanted by the end of the second day, day 3 was a leisurely day of catch and release (we blistered them day 3 too!).

In addition to the Halibut and Silvers, we also caught a coupla nice King Salmon, Pink Salmon, Ling Cod (to 30 lbs), Pacific Cod, a variety of Rock fish (to include Yellow Eye Rock fish) and a few other trash fish (yes, Dog Sharks too!). Our largest Halibut was 70 lbs but we did see a monster on the dock that went 264 lbs and another that went 157.

The Halibut where caught on both dead bait (whole Silver Salmon carcasses from the previous days catch) and jigs - 1 lb lead heads with large grub tails. Nothing like jigging a pound of lead in 300 ft of water! But, it's worth it when that Hally jumps the jig. The Silvers are a favorite of all to catch. Find the school and it is like bailing dolphin. Complete chaos in the cockpit with fish going everywhere in and out of the water.

Couple the great fishing with the enormously beautiful panorama of ice capped mountains, glaciers plugging into the sea, whales blowing and breaching, water fowl of great variety (including Puffins), Eagles, Stellar Seals, Sea otters and the occasional Mountain Goat, and you have one spectacular place to visit and fish.



Early this year I had the pleasure of helping Kevin Kirsh with his fishing show, the Mid-Atlantic Saltwater Fishing Expo in Richmond. There I was able to meet and friend Captain Mark Davis of Big Water Adventures, a national television fishing show host. We exchanged fishing stories and a few pics of what we have been fortunate to have accomplished in our lives.

Later we were talking and Mark said he would like to come back and go deep dropping for some species he has never caught off Virginia. After two failed attempts due to weather, we finally made it offshore.

I pulled up to my first mark and we dropped, as soon as the lines touched down, the rods doubled over, catching Mark his first ever Black Bellied Rosefish. We worked the area catching a few more before deciding to move on.

Next drop, we were greeted with some guality Wreckfish, another species in the box and another first for Mark. Since we caught a quick limit, we moved on.

I pulled up on one of my favorite areas and told them it would be a while before the baits hit bottom, when they did, Mark immediately hooked up on another first, a Golden Tile. We each cranked up a fish and although we are allowed up to 7 per person as part of the blue line/golden allocation, we limited ourselves to 1 a piece to help protect the fishery.

We finished the day much shallower catching blue line tiles, with fish coming over the rail as fast as we could drop. We did not take a limit, but more than enough for a few dinners.

All of Mark's fish were caught on Penn SFV 10500 Spinning Reel Combo, he was able to drop 20 ounces of lead to over 900' and crank fish up with ease, it's new Penn reel to be released soon.

The show will air early next year on the Outdoors Channel, I will post the date when I get it.

### MEAT-RUN, NORFOLK CANYON

LOCATION: Norfolk Canyon REPORTING ANGLER: Dr. James W. "Ike" Eisenhower

Fished the Norfolk Canyon Sun-Mon (12-13 Aug 12) with Mike Avery on his boat with Wesley and his son Jeremy. We left the trolling gear at home and this was a meat run. Left late on Sun to let the seas settle down from Saturday's blow. Got the canyon around 6:30 pm and bailed some mahi off the lobster balls so we could have some fresh strip bait for swords. They seem to love mahi strips. Netted some fresh squid at night too after watching the dolphin ball up the squid right next to the boat. What a cool sight at night. Many of our nice fish came from the fresh squid. During the night fishing for swords I fought a nice sword for about 20 minutes but it got off. Jeremy boated a pup sword for a release citation. At daybreak we headed for the deep dropping looking first for golden tilefish and grouper. I hooked a nice 32lb golden on the electric. Mike boated a 73 1/2lb snowy grouper on the electric reel. It would have been a state record if it was cranked in. He had a heck of a fight even with an electric since that fish tried to get back in a hole several times. Then we headed for a great black seabass and blueline tile area and bailed them until we just got too tired. It took me about 5 hours to clean all the fish now my freezers are full. Thanks for another great trip Mike.

### **OFFSHORE ACTION!**

LOCATION: Norfolk Canyon REPORTING ANGLER: Matt Butler

Last month, my father-in-law, my two brother-in-laws, and myself took a charter out of Teach's Lair in Hatteras on the Marlin Mania. The Marlin Mani is a 54' Carolina Custom captained by Jim Bowman.

We left the dock around 5:30am with slick seas and had the lines in the water about an hour later. We trolled for awhile picking up dolphin here and there. We picked up a couple gaffers along with several bailers.

At the time the birds were heavy picking at the bait on top of the water which made it interesting. I think we caught about four or five birds in process. The action slowed down and that's when Captain Bowman got a report that the fish had moved in closer to shore. We move location closer to shore and started working a large weed line. Within minutes, we had lines screaming off the reels. There were several times where we were all hooked up.

We had our limit of Dolphin and was back at the dock by 4:00. In the end we had over 250lbs of Dolphin.

### SAY AHHHHHHHHHHH!

#### LOCATION: Elizabeth River REPORTING ANGLER: Harry R. Hindmarsh

If you don't know me by now, it's time you do... If there is a red drum bite anywhere or any size... I'm there.

The Hot Ditch is loaded with 15" to 25" Red Drum. On just about any day, you can count on getting a "ditch slam" with a red, trout and stripers. I find that it's best when you have a 3-tide stratedy: High, low and the slack.

Of recent, high tide on cattails, mudflats or marsh grass are almost a given. A quarter-ounce jig head with just about any tail color will produced solid and hard bites. I make several casts until until I get a hit... if I'm not getting bites, I switch tail colors. Within two to three color tries, I'm usually on the fish.

The trout have been hugging the ledges and the stripers are doing the same.

When the bite is this consistent, I will play hookie, skip church, call in sick, lie to my loved ones and fish until my knuckles bleed.



The Norfolk Anglers Club and the East Ocean View Community Center came together on July 16th to provide youngsters from the Center a "taste" of what Ocean View is all about....fishing, learning, and camaraderie.

The Norfolk Anglers Club and the East Ocean View Community Center came together on July 16th to provide youngsters from the Center a "taste" of what Ocean View is all about....fishing, learning, and camaraderie. 50 youngsters, ages 8-14, from the Center's summer program were taken on a four-hour head boat fishing trip followed by a picnic funded by a grant the Norfolk Anglers Club received from the Virginia Marine Resources Commission. The purpose of the grant was threefold...to give the young people access to the Norfolk Anglers fishing community, to allow a time for sharing an activity with others in the community, and to afford the youngsters a better understanding of the Chesapeake Bay's abundant resources and hopefully build an appreciation for the need to protect these fragile resources.

The day began with youngsters being transported to the Ocean View Fishing Pier where Ronnie Boone Jr. had the Judith Ann Head Boat ready and waiting. The 50 young people were on board with 9 Norfolk Anglers as well as community center and city staff. Once the poles were in the water the fun began....by the end of the trip over 40 fish had been caught by these young anglers under the guidance of the Norfolk Anglers Club members.

While the kids were fishing, 9 Norfolk Anglers Club volunteers were at the Community Center preparing a meal for what turned out to be very hungry fishermen. When the busses brought the kids back to the center we heard a lot of "fish tales"....one young guy says he caught 11 fish while the kids behind him roared with laughter. The whole day was so satisfying for volunteers and staff members that the Norfolk Anglers Club has already applied for a grant for next year.

While the picnic was going on a few of the Norfolk Anglers cleaned the 40 fish the kids caught. The fish are going into the freezer at the Center. Center Director Jacqueline Johnson is going have a fish fry soon where the young people of the center will eat the vegetables they've grown in the Center's Community Garden along with the fish they caught on this wonderful fishing day. Ms Johnson says it's all about sustainability.
