












Fishing Tips...

Fishing Rigs & Wolfpack Jigs with Jimmy Kolb

Flounder Fishing: Flounder are sight feeders, they prefer to remain hidden on the bottom along the structure and ambush bait fish as they pass. Slowly working a Wolfpack Jig along the bottom rigged plain or with a piece of strip bait will entice a strike as it passes the flounder. Jimmy advises it's important to use a slow up & down jig movement of about 8 inches. You don't want it too far off the bottom but high enough for the fish to see the movement. When you feel more weight on the jig it's time to set the hook. Flounder will often grab the bait with its sharp teeth and hold it before swallowing. When feeling a small hit on the jig, allow it to drop back to give the flounder another chance to strike. Quite often a flounder will hit the jig again as it moves away.









Another method for flounder is to use a bottom rig. Jimmy Kolb uses a bit different approach to rigging - treble hooks. That's a #4 Treble (x4 Strong) rigged to a short 4 inch drop. Rigging bait onto the treble hook is no different for cut or live bait. The advantage of a treble hook when fishing flounder is once the flounder takes the bait into its mouth there's three hooks pointing in three different directions to hook the fish. Often Jimmy will find his flounder hooked with two of the barbs once they swallowed the bait.


When fishing bottom rigs remember to "Fish Lightly"; lightly bounce the sinker off the rocks to prevent hangs. You'll be able to 'feel' the bottom as you set the sinker, especially if using braid for your main line. As your sinker contacts the rocks it'll roll off and snag between the rocks if you don't fish lightly. Your drift must also be slow enough to continually bounce it off the bottom structure.

<u>Wirelining Flounder:</u> Wireline fishing can be challenging if you're new to the technique. It takes practice to get the rigs in the right place, maintain boat position, and react to other boat traffic and breakoffs "you're going to break off some rigs" Jimmy cautions. Wirelining



requires that you fish your lures (1/4 oz Jigs) on longer than average leaders, like 20 ft, to allow them to wash over the structure. For good wirelining technique you should line your boat path up with the side of the CBBT Buildings and fish from shallow to deeper water. If you can't see down the side of the building or see too much of the side, you're out of position. Jimmy advises to not use more than a 12oz sinker when wirelining.

You'll want our sinker to give with the current. A heavy sinker won't do that and is more likely to snag on the rocks. A 3-Way Swivel connects the wireline to the leader and a 4 ft mono drop to the sinker.

Fishing Rigs & Wolfpack Jigs with Jimmy Kolb

Offshore Flounder Jigging: Fishing for flounder on the offshore wrecks isn't much different than inshore. Water depth is near 100 ft at the Triangle Reef area and it's broken structure vice the rocks you find around the CBBT. Jig weight increases with deeper water, so select a Wolfpack Jig in the 3-4 ounce range to make sure you get to the bottom and can work it. You'll also want to work the jig a bit harder than you do in shallower water.

Baits for Flounder: Strip baits are common when fishing flounder. A piece of cut bait about 4 inches long will often be the trick to induce a strike. Some of the most durable stip baits are Cobia belly and strips cut from Rays. The skin is quite tough and will hold up when other fish are hitting on your bait. Always check your bait before dropping it down. Strips cut from Cobia or Ray need to be trimmed thin enough to swim with the current. Another good bait for flounder is Spanish Mackerel strips. Spanish Macs have durable skin and oily skin, They'll hold up well and provide a lot of fish oil around your jig. Sometimes all it takes is a bit of fish oil or other scent in the water to turn on the bite. Jimmy Kolb will sometimes use a few cans of cat food dumped in a paper bag and dropped to the bottom. "Cat Food is your Friend"... as the bag disolved the cat food releases into the water and creates a bite.



Landing Big Flounder: So, now that you've hooked into that large flounder what do you do? Resist the celebration until it's in the fish box. Once you've got a good hook set, use a steady retrieve all the way up to the net. Giving a fish slack in the line and with one good head shake you'll find yourself wondering what happened. Have the net ready by holding the excess net material so it doesn't foul the hook, fish, boat, buddy or

whatever. Use a steady dip motion under the fish and release the net material as the fish drops.

The funding for the trip was provided by a grant from the Virginia Marine Resources Commission as well as funds from the NAC.





Well Done to the Norfolk Anglers Club for placing 3rd in the most challenging fishing conditions.



Aug 15: Deep Dropping the Norfolk Canyon

With the weekend weather forecast as beautiful as it gets, it wasn't a difficult decision on where to go... the Norfolk Canyon.

Mike Delbridge, Jim Ceclic, Danny Shoosmith and I headed out on a gorgeous Saturday morning and two hours later we were dropping on the Norfolk Canyon for Golden Tilefish. Rigs were simple double droppers with 10/0 Circle hooks baited with fresh mackerel and squid. Drift was less than .5 knots and soon we had a monster 40# Golden in the box followed shortly by another 38#.

Over the next couple of hours we boxed two more before moving over to a Blueline Tilefish area. Some switched rigs to lighter tackle but Danny schooled us when he stayed with "big bait & big hooks for big fish". While we were boating respectable 5-8 pound bluelines, Danny was dropping 10-12.5 pounders in the fish box, one after another. It didn't take long before we all had large baits tempting the Bluelines and it paid off. We landed a total of 28 Tilefish (4 Golden Tilefish and 24 Blueline Tilefish) for a combined weight of 274 pounds of fish.

We made a quick detour over to the Ocean Venture wreck for a few drifts and not finding what we wanted headed back to Vinings Landing Marine Center at a very comfortable 36 knots. - Will Bransom

















24 AUG: Caught 4 groupers at the second island Monday Aug 24 5 to 6 inches long - Mike Delbridge

15 AUG: I left the dock at Vining's Landing around 6:30am to calm seas. I my goal was to hit some buoys before the all boat traffic in attempt to catch my first cobia. I headed straight to the Baltimore Channel as the sun was coming up over the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel. I got to the Baltimore Channel and pulled up to a buoy with a good size eel locked and load. I threw the eel up current and let it drift back pass the buoy back toward the boat. After few tries and no luck on this buoy I head to the second buoy, the CY Buoy. I pulled up to the CY Buoy and blind casted the eel up current of the buoy to let it drift back. I left the bail open to allow the eel to swim down and do his

The line started peeling off the reel and I waited a few seconds before locking it down to make sure if it was a cobia he ate the eel. After a few seconds I set the hook and I could feel the headshake. Line started peeling off the reel and I knew I had hook my first cobia. Now the trick was to land the thing. After a few minutes of fighting the fish I was able to net it and get it into the boat. He measured 40 inches.

Trolled in the evening to 10 pm and had some skippy knock downs and lost a small YFT that pulled the hook. At dusk we had a huge bite that dumped 3/4 of the spool before

chewing through the 130 lb leader and broke off. Hit a Sterling Tackle pink squid chain with a blue/white 3 oz Joe Shute from Sterling. Dam, I got the BE jinx going this year. Once we rolled the throttles back had a drifter bite that we thought was a BE double but turned out to be a huge dusky, first of many shark encounters.

Setup on the drift and started chunking butters with 2 swords lines out one below and one above the thermocline. Also put out one float tuna line and one feeder. We soon found out that anything with meat got sharked pretty fast so we resorted to jigging in the chunk line. That was the ticket and good action most of the night on the jig. Mostly small but keeper tuna. Had to get the tuna in the boat fast or you just got a head back.





We were able to limit out of small YFT with 18 in the box with about half throw backs and half keepers. Good action at night with not much sleep.

Got back on the troll in the am hoping to find that BE we lost but no action at all. Finished off the morning with a few more drops and got 5 more goldens for a total of 14. Great overnighter with 2 of my favorite eats, YFT and golden tile. Nice to

Henry Troutner also got underway with 3 soldiers and one of their son's. They left out of Little Creek at 6:30AM to beautiful weather. The group fished several buoys and the CBBT between 2nd and 3rd island without seeing anything before anchoring up on 9' shoal and chummed. Sharks were thick and the group enjoyed catch & release. They had one large cobia enter the slick but despite throwing eels and jigs it was not interested in getting caught. Later in the morning they hooked up a large fish which subsequently spit the hook. At one point they had about 1/2 dozen small sharks swimming near the stern and caught several on light spinning tackle. Once out of eels and chum, they moved to the 3rd island and made a few unsuccessful drifts for flounder. However, they did catch a decent size bluefish and the obligatory toadfish. The picnic was great, good food and several nice prizes. Overall it was a very enjoyable trip; nice

guys, wonderful weather and some pullage to keep things interesting.




Needing a Bigger Boat for Flounder Fishing



Wolfgang Vogelbein gave an update on the recent algal bloom activity in the York River. These photos, taken by Dr. Vogelbein on August 17, were captured to get a better understanding of the

spatial extent and density of the current algal blooms. Vogelbein summarizes his observations as follows:

- 1. Bloom activity reaches to West Point on the York and can be seen along the entire river.
- 2. Highest bloom density resides in the mouth of the York River, mostly out of view from the Coleman Bridge
- 3. Bloom activity in most of Mobjack Bay and its tributaries is low.
- 4. Bloom activity in Back and Poquoson Rivers is low, and moderate in the mouth of the James and Elizabeth Rivers. We will continue to keep you updated!

MAMFC and ASMSC recommending 29% REDUCTION in 2016 Flounder Catch



The Mid-Atlantic Fishery Management Council (Council) and the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (Commission) met jointly in New York, NY to establish specifications for the summer flounder, scup, black sea bass, and bluefish fisheries. The Council's recommendations apply to federal waters (3 - 200 miles from shore) and will be forwarded to NOAA Fisheries Greater Atlantic Regional Fisheries Administrator for approval. The Commission's actions are final and apply to state waters (0-3 miles from

For summer flounder, the Council and Commission approved an Acceptable Biological Catch (ABC) limit of 16.26 million pounds for the 2016 fishing year. This represents an approximate 29% decrease relative to the 2015 ABC, representing a commercial quota of 8.12 million pounds and a recreational harvest limit of 5.42 million pounds for the 2016 fishing year.

These reductions in summer flounder catch and landings limits were recommended based on the findings of the 2015 stock assessment update, which indicates that the summer flounder stock was experiencing overfishing in 2014. The fishing mortality rate in 2014 was estimated to be 16% above the fishing mortality threshold reference point.


